Senior Wellness Examinations

In your pet's senior years it becomes more important than ever to keep up with a regular examination schedule. Routine examinations are beneficial in detecting early signs of age related diseases and conditions. Exams will also provide you with the opportunity to ask any questions you may have about the aging process and how you can provide the best care for your pet.

As pets age it is not uncommon for major organs, such as the liver and kidneys, to begin to have decreased function. These changes are not always apparent to pet owners because organ damage is usually severe by the time a pet starts exhibiting signs that something is wrong. Annual blood screening can aid in early detection of liver and kidney damage, and allow the opportunity to discuss long term treatment and prognosis with a veterinarian. Many medications can affect liver and kidney function with long term use and veterinarians may recommend yearly bloodwork to monitor function of these vital organs.

Routine examinations provide an opportunity for the veterinarian to evaluate various areas of the body that can be affected by aging. It is not uncommon for aging pets to suffer from arthritis and other problems affecting the muscles and joints. Your veterinarian will discuss a care plan for your pet to manage the pain and inflammation associated with these conditions. The veterinarian will also evaluate heart and lung sounds in search of any irregularities. Heart murmurs and arrhythmias can indicate the beginning of heart disease and provide the opportunity for discussions on how to manage or treat any associated conditions. Teeth and gums will also be evaluated for the presence of plaque, tartar and gingivitis, all of which contribute to the overall health of your pet.

Early detection plays an integral role in the ability to effectively treat and manage certain disease processes. The McLeod Veterinary care team can help you in formulating a care plan suitable to your pet's individual needs to assist in the aging process.
