Off-Leash Park Etiquette

The off-leash park can be a great place to socialize and exercise your pooch. Here are some tips to keep the park a pleasant and safe place.

- Do not take your puppy until FULLY immunized against viruses, this should be around 17 weeks of age. Dogs should also be on an appropriate deworming schedule.
- Do not take a sick dog.
- If your dog becomes agitated/aggressive/threatening with dogs...it may be time to leave.
- Supervise your dog at all times.
- Always bring poop bags and clean up your dog's waste.
- Consider bringing water for your dog, especially during summer months.
- Always bring a leash...you never know when you might need it.

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Celebrating our senior pets

Our goal is to help senior pets live a long and healthy life. We believe in a proactive approach to your pet's health. Our pets age at a much quicker rate than we do. Consider that one year for us is the equivalent of 5-7 years for your pet. Many changes to your pet's health can occur during a short period of time.

For pets 10 years and older we recommend:

- Physical Examination every 6 months: It's important to have your pet's heart, teeth, eyes, joints, muscles and other organs evaluated to ensure a good quality of life.
- Annual Blood Analysis: Senior pets are prone to certain diseases and conditions which can be detected with blood analysis. Early detection and treatment may prolong your pet's life.
- Nutritional Consultation: Senior diets are formulated to address the needs of aging pets. Findings from the physical exam or blood analysis may indicate the need for a therapeutic diet.

This proactive approach to your pet's health can be crucial in improving your pet's quality of life. It's very common for senior cats to develop kidney insufficiencies. Early detection and early treatment can greatly reduce or delay this disease process. Early detection and treatment of osteoarthritis in dogs and cats can greatly improve their quality of life. A therapeutic diet can reduce or eliminate the need for pain relief and nutraceuticals. There are many other medical conditions and diseases that may arise in aging pets and may not cause any obvious symptoms or changes in your pet's attitude.

Holiday Hazards

During the holiday season many of us decorate our homes and host parties for our relatives and friends. It's important to be aware of items and foods to keep away from our pets. Our pets are creatures of habit and changes in their routine can cause them great stress. If your pet suffers from anxiety with company and visitors, consider speaking with your veterinarian about options to reduce your pet's stress. There

may be behavioral modification, pharmaceutics, nutraceuticals or therapeutic diets that may reduce your pet's anxieties.

Please be cautious with food items, decorations and children's toys. Dogs and cats are curious animals and they may chew or eat items that can be toxic or dangerous to them.

Here are some common holiday hazards to be aware of:

- Poinsettias, Holly and Mistletoe
 These plants vary in their toxicity levels; however, they all have the potential to make your pet sick.
- Chocolate, Grapes, Nuts and Onions
 Please be careful with all the above food items. Don't assume that because it's gift wrapped your pet won't be interested. Chocolate toxicity is very common during this holiday season. Generally speaking the darker the chocolate the more severe the toxicity.
