Laser Therapy

McLeod Veterinary Hospital is pleased to announce that we will now be offering laser therapy to our patients!

Laser therapy is a non-invasive treatment to reduce pain and inflammation, increase circulation, and increase healing. A laser beam is passed across the affected area, producing a small amount of heat while being absorbed by the tissues and cells. Laser therapy causes no discomfort to pets during treatment and is indicated for a variety of conditions including (but not limited to);

- Arthritis
- Wound Healing
- Skin Conditions
- Post-surgery
- Soft Tissue Trauma

Some conditions require multiple and/or routine treatments to achieve the desired goal, although many may experience relief of symptoms immediately or within the first 24 hours following treatment.

Nexgard and Bravecto

You may have recently seen a media release from the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Some concerns were brought forth regarding certain types of flea/tick medications, including Nexgard, and their link to seizures in pets.

There have been no changes to these products since their launch years ago. The incidence of seizures from this class of medications is very remote.

To date, our hospital has not seen any seizure activity as an adverse reaction from Nexgard. This class of medications is still safe and we continue to recommend them to treat/prevent ticks and fleas.

Deer ticks are still prevalent at this time of year, so flea/tick prevention is still recommended for dogs at risk.

Legalization of Cannabis

With the recent legalization of cannabis, care must be taken to eliminate accidental ingestion and potential toxicity in pets. Signs of ingestion may include; lethargy, disorientation/loss of coordination, dilated pupils, increased vocalization, respiratory depression, and a drop in body temperature. In severe cases, tremors, seizures, and coma may result. Cannabis should always be stored out of reach of pets.

CBD (cannabidiol) oil is becoming a hot topic of conversation in veterinary medicine. While these products may prove to have valuable therapeutic benefits, there currently is not enough scientific research to support safety, dosing recommendations, or treatment protocols in pets.

K/D + Mobility

Chronic kidney disease (CKD) is a prevalent disease process among senior cats, that affects 1 out of 3 cats over the age of 12 years. Although progressive, CKD can be managed with medications and diet. Early detection is key, and with appropriate nutritional management, quality of life can be supported. Studies have shown that 90% of cats over the age of 12 years also suffer from degenerative joint disease (DJD). Hill's K/D + Mobility has been formulated to help manage these two common conditions.
